

I will likely get the adjustable tool and will have to work out the equivalent torque for the torque wrench when located offset in the square hole. The torque spec in the manual is for a wrench located on the axis of the adapter ring, not offset. Other bikes specify this value at a specified offset. The adjustable wrench would be applicable to many different bikes so I can justify the price.




